Jay's background



Sunrise — 34' Topsail Ketch


This shows the original rig – too small for the light airs usually found in Puget Sound & BC, our cruising ground.

The authors of the book have run many Six-Hour Canoe classes at Buffalo. The class outline is in the book; it uses two weekends.




We built six hour canoes twice with our kids and their 6th grade friends. This is the first time. Each time a boat was sold at a fund raising auction.

Six-Hour Canoe plans are in the book



Laying out the side panels

Using the dimensions on the drawing, we laid out the shape of the side panels. It was handy to have the drafting tools right at hand in the adjoining office.



Frame assembly

Using the drawings, we laid out and assembled the frame. This is where we made one frame with more flare than the other. You can see the result in later photos.



Marking the bottom for cutting.

Author Bill Bartoo was working in our design office and guided us through the process. Here he's demonstrating how to mark the bottom panel for final fitting.

Preparation

In the book there is an outline of a 4 day building program. They have successfully used it many, many times.



This is a straightforward boat to build whether you're an amateur or a professional. It's the perfect family weekend project, great for school or community groups, or just a treat for yourself.














