

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The Hard Truth of Replica Ships

- "Romance" can kill you.
- Historically, these ships were engines of state (warships) or engines of commerce (merchant vessels) and they paid their own way by plunder, taxation, or profit.
- Historic vessels tend to cost money even when standing still, much less while in full operation.
- It costs about
 ~\$1,000,000 for a
 modern "relic" to sit
 at the dock.
- Many traditional wooden ship designs are "rot factories" and required extensive rebuilds during their careers.

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In 1979, there was an advertisement in the National Fisherman.

- Modest ambitions are usually better
- We found some plans for a very small "viking" ship.
- We found a builder who knew what he was doing.





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...and the next thing we knew, we were back in action!

- "King Harald Hardratha didn't build his own ships, and neither do we!"
- Reorganized as a non-profit educational organization instead of a cross between a campus club and a joint stock company.

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Research and Expansion

- The size of the vessel should reflect the size, and health, of the organization; don't get too ambitious, too soon.
- Several smaller vessels could be more versatile than one oversized vessel.

- Money and manpower- do you have 30+ friends for an afternoon jaunt on your longship?
- Who scrapes the bottom?
- What are your resources for historical and archeological research?



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Evolution-

- Founders should not cling to power; know when to step back and hand it over.
- A small core group ALWAYS does most of the stuff; but you can shift into a guidance roll for newer members
- Start a "new ship fund" the day you get your current ship. The group's needs, and research regarding these vessels, are always changing.
- Members who don't pay their dues but show up for work parties are as good as members who pay their dues but can't show up for a voyage. You can use both; but encourage both to do both.



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It Takes a Village to Raze a Village







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Food, clothing, shelter, power- women's work!

- Every thread and stitch in the sails, the clothes on your back, provisions in your pack, the tents you sheltered under were all, primarily, women's work!
- People who can take a field of flax or a flock of sheep and turn into useful things are not to be wasted.
- What they lack in physical power, they tend to make up for in physical endurance.



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"Of course, the women would not have rowed." (British historian and author)

- Fully integrated, in organization and crew, from the very beginning.
- It's the 21st century; get used to it!
- Viking women were among the most independent of their time.

- "Hey, ya wanna come out on my 40 foot yacht?" (surefire hunk and chick bait)
- We emphasize current and historic attitudes towards our roles and our abilities.

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Newer, bigger, better, and a lot more work- a race horse instead of a sturdy dray.








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The old ship's tent...
